

ON THE GREENBELT by Joe Welz

Weed mitigation, this year I thought I would be green and just wait till things dry out before weed whipping. Wrong!!! Letting weeds live through their life cycle means maximum seed production for next season, more silage left on the ground to track in the house, harder to cut, cutting a month later increasing fire danger. In my opinion spray herbicide as soon as it is warm enough! When it's dead and dry whack it down to dirt then spot spray for secondary weeds as needed. The reasons to cut tall weeds; wildland fire! Tall grass is a latter fuel that can ignite spot fires a mile ahead of the fire line depending on the wind.

When you cut the grass down to dirt, if there is a snake around you can see it. Mice without a place to hide will leave the area. Cutting the tall weeds also makes it easier for hawks to pray upon rodents. Ticks climb to the top of tall grass and wait for a victim to walk by and grab a hold of. If bitten and a baseball size red mark or "red bulls' eye" appears this is a precursor to Lyme disease and you need to see a doctor immediately.

Glass bottles; Please do not break them! Dogs, people, horses and wildlife can be seriously cut by broken glass. Glass bottles thrown into tall grass can and will start fires! Please put all trash in the garbage cans provided. Thank you.

Tall, thick grass and fire ganger, there are more people on Quads, motorcycles and side by sides than ever. Please stay on existing trails, do not drive through the tall grass you may wreck and start a FIRE! One fella stopped while I was working to say hello. While there I noticed oil burning off the engine. If that thing catches fire and burns homes down, who will be responsible for fire damage and home's lot to fire?

I have made an observation of huge clouds of dust at the Community Center parking lot and at the campground's main gate. These areas had gravel to prevent dust and mud but Community children on Quads, motorcycles and cars doing burnouts, donuts, and fish tails shoot all that gravel to God knows where! Little darlings, who pays to fix that? Watch out for wildlife. Be fire safe. Have fun! Till next time.

The Northshore Fire Hogback Ridge Crew will provide a wood chipping crew for properties in Lake County. CLERC is the group applying for and receiving the grants to cover the cost of this program. Thus, they need to do the paperwork to report to the agency issuing the grant. A big THANK YOU to the Hogback Ridge Crew and CLERC for their services.

Now that the rain is letting up Wolf Creek Firewise will be available to assist clearing properties for our neighbors in Spring Valley and Long Valley. Be aware that we work in the mornings, and, as we are volunteers, we stop work when we get too tired, too hot, or too hungry.:-) If you need help from Firewise volunteers, or would like to help, call 707-998-3004.

As of January 1, 2024, the California Regulation for the Property Level Wildfire Mitigation (Title 10, Section: 2644.9) has begun. What does this mean for each residence? The brochure mailed out recently advising Home Hardening is now a law that you must comply with. If you have a mortgage, this may affect your home fire insurance. Discuss this with your agent or you can go online to Wildfire Prepared Home web page for more complete information.



As of May 1, the burn bann will be in effect until the next rainy season.

CSA #2 ADVISORY BOARD by Cindy Storrs

Meeting Minutes May 1, 2024

Special Guests: Scott Harter, Jesse Salmeron, from Special Districts Minutes of April 3 meeting approved

- <u>Public Input:</u> PGE diverting traffic through the CC parking lot; Helen will follow up with PGE about this and the possibility of paving the parking lot as a result of excess traffic/use;
- <u>ERTH mtg:</u> Spring Valley resident Summer Trongo was awarded a Challenge Coin from the Lake Co. Fire Chiefs, specifically Northshore Fire Chief Mike Ciancio for her actions at a traffic collision on New Long Valley Road
- <u>PGE undergrounding project:</u> Signage needs improvement Helen will add links to Public Works and Special Districts in next newsletter; (See links below) PGE will send a representative to the next CSA meeting; starting on Pomo Trail and continuing with all "Class 3" areas;
- <u>Chalk Mountain Bridge:</u> PGE working in the area of CC and Chalk Mtn. now so they are out of the way in July when the girders arrive for the bridge, July 22, 23;
 - Additional: if you have vehicle damaged as a result of road conditions submit a claim to the county
- Scott Harter and Jesse Salmeron addressing the community concerns re: tax money, water rates, roads: water funds can only be used for water, there will most likely be an increase in water bill in order to cover the increasing costs of water; possibility of Co. Public Wors to take over maintenance of Spring Valley roads in the near future; Spring Valley is a "Zone of Benefit" and property taxes will be used to enter into a service contract for repairs; a larger road project could be undertaken, but there are limited funds for road repairs; no gas tax funds are available for SV roads; the hot asphalt machine will be purchased and utilized.

Additional: (not our service area), but Scott could address this concern: some kind of bridge installed to offer a second way out of the valley in the event of fire. Scott will look into this further.

- Water Rate Study/Proposition 218 to increase water rates: looking at ways to decrease expenses; will increase the budget by \$20,000 for roads, CSA Finance Committee will make a few changes to the budget request and re-submit to SD; looking at water rate increase that is spread out over 5 years; Scott feels like SD has an excellent Grant Committee;
 - Additional: (also not CSA responsibility, however Scott spoke to the issue) a state
 mandated secondary water source; looking for a well driller, working with Lakeport on
 similar project; capacity fees being looked at, it is designed to offset the cost of a
 property added to the plant and distribution system
- <u>Pothole box at the Pantry:</u> available forms from residents to notice SD of a road issue; Scott asked that residents use the direct call/email to SD when there is an issue
 - Additional: the Walker Ridge Wind Farm project is officially "dead". Paperwork to this affect will be signed 5/2; Scott will address some of the issues that are existing at the mouth of the valley on NLV road with the hillside slippage and gully that is currently full of rocks.
 - Additional: Lakebed recovery, SD continues their work with the ACOE to obtain permits for the project.
